SEE'S ORDERING ONLINE THIS YEAR

This year See's Candy fundraising will not be the same as in the past. Thanks to Covid-19, it forced us to change the process, as well as the name!

It's now called "Yumraising", and it's all "Virtual".

Just think about it; no more buying candy from the store, keeping the inventory at Pete's garage (Pete and Judi will be happy), setting up store front tables, protecting the candies from sun or rain (members



will be happy), collecting money, checks, credit cards, counting the money every night (Jeff will be happy), depositing the money and checks at the bank (Kathy will be happy), and finally reconciling the inventory and bank account at the end of sales (Jeff will be happy), and a few other steps! But under the virtual sales, after identifying your potential donors and forwarding the attached letter to them, we all can sit back, relax, and see the money roll-in!

1. Yumraising ends December 4.

2. Buyers will be charged for shipping per following: Under \$35= \$6.95, \$35-\$65= \$4.95, Over \$65 is free 3. Buyers will pay See's directly via credit card (Visa, MC, etc). The candies will be shipped to the location stated in the order form by the buyer.

4. For purchases by retirees at the Senior Livings, a separate procedure will be worked out soon.

5. Due to complexity of ordering and shipping candies to the Marine Base, we will have to develop a separate practical procedure.

6. Once the Yumraising ends on December 4, no more orders will be accepted by See's company. Meanwhile, a profit check will be processed within 15 business days (after Dec. 4) and made payable to Kiwanis Club of Mission Viejo.
